




# **REMINDER:**

# Meet the Members: Ilenya A. Marrin



Age six, enchanted by fairy tales, I had a Big Chief tablet and a fat pencil. My visiting grandmother wrote poems, mainly about us kids. Not yet grokking poems, I wrote a play about the Fairy Queen, who bore striking similarities to me. I wanted my siblings to act it out with me as the Queen!

My family moved a good deal when I was young, but I graduated from Lee and later UT in Austin. I worked in Tyler for a few years, spent two years in London, then trekked to Las Vegas, which led to meeting my husband in Huntington Beach. Thanks to his career as an engineer in the defense industry, we lived in Tucson, Los Angeles, Detroit, Burlington, Detroit again, then Wichita.

After years in social services, publicity management, psychotherapy and some consulting/facilitating, I taught psychology. ## **Tighten Your Writing**

Lydia Holley

Is your writing flabby? Put your story through an exercise program! Trim off the excessive words and tone your writing muscles by doing the following:

• Cut away 'hedge words'. Hedge words don't refer to shrubs pruned to one height—it's the "noncommittal or evasive statements" you want to cut. Some hedge words should you be looking for:

Started to

Sort of

Kind of

Almost

Seems

And many others . . .



- Other words you want to look for are the three
  words 'up', 'down', and 'that'. While sometimes these are necessary, many times they can be cut
  without changing the meaning. For instance, "She sat down on the chair." Could read, "She sat on the
  chair." And "She stood up." Could be cut to "She stood." 'That' is sometimes needed, but often 'that'
  can be cut, too. (try reading that sentence without the second 'that'—it works)
- Check your adjectives. If you have more than one adjective describing something, consider choosing the one that best fits. Instead of saying, "She walked into the big, tall, and commanding home," use only 'stately' instead, and cut the rest.
- Check for adverbs. See if you can substitute a stronger verb instead.
- Don't show off. Perhaps you love to use words which are sesquipedalian. But, do you want to show off or do you want your readers to keep reading? I once read a book with so many sagacious words, I finally put the book down. You don't want your reader to do the same. Always choose the simplest word which fits. (Unless you're writing to others with sesquipedalian tendencies.)
- Check for redundancies other than 'up' and 'down,' such as: "He got to thinking, and in his mind, he wondered if she had really meant what she'd told him all those years ago when she was younger."

  Just say: "He wondered if she had meant what she'd told him years ago."

#### Online writer resources:

\*Literary agent blogs are invaluable—they're free, and the agents give all kinds of writing and publishing/submission advice. They are the **experts** in knowing what works and what doesn't, in terms of plot, characterization, pacing, etc (since they read hundreds of submissions each month). \*The BEST resource on the internet, in my humble opinion, is a writers forum called *Absolute Writes*. It's been around for 20 years, and has a wealth of info on every topic under the sun. You don't have to join in order to read, but you do have to join in order to participate. My advice is to spend a LOT of time reading first. The writers on this board are nice people, but they don't like it when newbies step in and ask questions that have already been asked a million times. Honestly, you'll probably find any answer you'll ever need on this enormous forum, without having to ask a single question.

It also has THE best resource for researching publishers and agents. If you want to make sure the agent/publisher you're submitting to is legit, be sure to check out this link first. It's the "Bewares, Recommendations, and Background Check" thread, where writers come to praise or gripe about agents and publishers. They are VERY honest in their assessments, which is what we want, as writers.

This is the best place to come and check out a publisher/agent, and see if there are any red flags before you submit.

## Beware the New Pirates!

Pirates. If you're on the high seas and they surround you, what do you do? Perhaps you haven't thought of that situation. Neither, I bet, have you considered what to do if pirates surround you on dry ground. But it's more likely to happen.

What am I talking about? Al-generated books being uploaded on authors' Amazon and Goodreads pages which are NOT authored by them.

The Alliance of Independent Authors (ALLi) has warned, "We're seeing an uptick in fraudulent author impersonations on Amazon, but with a new twist. We're seeing scammers uploading Al-generated garbage with legitimate authors' names attached to it. Because Al allows them to churn out dozens of these impersonations, the volume of those scams has increased dramatically, and the frequency of incorrect author linking has increased with it. Amazon is reportedly working on a fix to prevent these from being linked to an author without authorization, but until that's ready, it's a good idea to check your author page periodically to ensure nothing was added to it without your approval. Regardless of Amazon's fix, it's a good idea to search for your pen name(s) and titles once in a while to check for impersonations or piracy."

This happened to Jane Friedman lately, and she had a hard time getting them OFF her pages. She states, "This was not theft of my KDP account. It was someone using their own Amazon KDP account and uploading several books—even a three-book series!—and passing off those books as authored by me." It's not just 'big authors', either. She states, "I realize that many authors—self-publishing authors in particular—have been dealing with these problems already." And "When I complained about this on Twitter/X, an author responded that she had to report 29 illegitimate books in just the last week alone. 29!"

It took some finagling for Friedman to get those titles off her Amazon page. She stated Goodreads was easier, but not by much: "If you need to have your Goodreads profile corrected—as far as the books credited to you—you have to reach out to volunteer 'librarians' on Goodreads, which requires joining a group, then posting in a comment thread that you want illegitimate books removed from your profile."

The comments on her post are mostly from horrified authors, however, a few are from people who have been hit and, as of yet, have been unable to rectify the situation. While I am saddened this happened to Friedman (or anyone at all), I appreciate Friedman bringing attention to this issue and posting about some possible solutions.

The pirates are here—be on your guard!
