Meet Louise Jackson Guest Speaker for April

Louise A. Jackson is the author of two novels and three picture books: Exiled! From Tragedy to Triumph on the Missouri Frontier; Gone To Texas: From Virginia to Adventure; H is for Hope; Grandpa Had a Windmill, Grandma Had a Churn; and Over on the River. She has written professional articles published in various magazines and journals, including The Reading Teacher, Language Arts, Journal of the West, and Roundup. In addition to being recognized for her writing, Jackson is much in demand as a speaker. Her spirited presentations to children and youth in schools and libraries and her practical in-service sessions with teachers, librarians and writing groups are highly praised.

A fifth-generation Texan, Jackson grew up on the family ranch in Central Texas, where she and her younger brother climbed trees, rode horses, and raised orphan goats and calves.

During her elementary years, Jackson attended both a *one*-teacher school and a *three*-teacher school and graduated from a small rural high school. Her career in teaching included stints in both Texas and Wyoming, where she taught in elementary classrooms, was a special reading teacher, and also a university professor of literacy.

Jackson now lives in Tyler, Texas. She likes to read, write, and walk her Norfolk Terrier, *Kashi*. She has been to most of the U.S. and parts of Canada, Mexico, Western Europe, and Argentina.

Jackson's last novel, *Exiled!* won the WIL-LA award for "the best children's book about women in the West" in 2008. In 2022, she won the Laura Ingalls Wilder *Literary Award* for the body of her work.

The WILLA Literary Awards recognizes the best annual literature featuring women's or girls' stories set in the North American West. The award is named after Pulitzer-winning author Willa Cather.

The *Children's Literature Legacy Award*, (formerly known as the *Laura Ingalls Wilder Medal*), honors authors or illustrators whose books, published in the United States, have made subtantial and lasting contributions to literature for children.



Libby Likes This!

Monthly Column by *Libby James April Book Review: Saints at the River*

Dear Reader,

When I started my own book club ten years ago, my only expectation was to read GOOD books. What really constitutes a good book? In my experience, a good book can be any genre, any length, but it must stir conversation or leave a lingering impression. A GREAT book moves my soul in a forever sort of way and ensures I will tell friends and strangers they must read it. I'll buy a pretty hardback copy for my bookshelf. I'll reread it three or four times and still find it remarkable. But GREAT is rare, so GOOD was, and continues to be, the standard.

Saints at the River, by Ron Rash, is a good book with some excellent writing. The book begins with the tragic death of twelve-year-old Ruth, drowned in the Tamassee River, and follows the tumultuous battle between her parents, who want to retrieve her body, and the naturalists, who want to protect the river. Family, cultural roots, politics, religion, and the law collide in rustic Oconee County, South Carolina, before a decision about Ruth's remains is made (no spoilers here).

While I enjoyed reading about the central conflict, I felt ambiguous toward the protagonist, Maggie, and her *I-saw-that-coming* love interest, Allen. Ron Rash delves into the past, but the

present never gets fully resolved leaving the subplot(s) feeling unnecessary. Moreover, the parents of Ruth aren't given much substance. Her father is made out to be stoic but unlikeable, perhaps even unloving. His wife doesn't warrant a first name and plays a limited role in the entire situation. On the other hand, Luke, the sworn protector of the Tamassee, and in many ways the antagonist who "believed you saw the essentials in black and white," is given depth of character and conviction and *almost* comes to life. In the end, the river leaves the deepest impression, and perhaps that is what Ron Rash intended:

"On that September morning, I understood...that what we were trying to save was holy, for I was not just in the presence of something sacred and eternal but for a few seconds inside it. Spots of time was the phrase Wordsworth used for such moments, but the poet's words were no better than mine because what I felt was beyond any words that had ever been used before. You needed a new language, as members of the church I'd grown up in sometimes did..."
