President's Message...

March is here! With Spring just around the corner, it's an exciting time to be an author. There are many opportunities to get out there and peddle your books or other items you create. My sources for the events listed on page six of this newsletter are the Facebook groups *East Texas* Vendors and East Texas Vendor Events, but I have also found events by searching small town websites or by word of mouth. These events usually charge a fee to set up a booth, and the outdoor events, such as Lindale's Piney Woods Wine Festival, advise setting up a tent canopy. It's also fun to share a booth with a friend/fellow author. That way you have help putting up your tent and tables and have someone to watch the booth while you take a break or get lunch. Food trucks are usually parked at these events as well.

As a book vendor, what do you bring? I bring plenty of copies of all my books, a six-foot or four-foot folding table with tablecloth, my collapsible wagon for toting everything, a small cooler with drinks and snacks, bills for change, my Square POS scanner, stands for my books, posters, rack cards with rack, business cards, price list, and any freebies I might have, such as stickers, pens, etc. I also bring a jacket, battery-operated fan (if it's warm), my tent canopy with stakes (important to keep it from blowing away – believe me, that is a disaster!), and two folding chairs.

Be prepared for windy, sunny, hot, or cold conditions and dress accordingly. Don't forget your smile and winning personality, along with a great sales pitch. Not only might you sell books at these events, you get exposure as an an author. You meet people in the community and possibly make new friends. You get to talk about your books face-to-face with potential readers and explain your background and why you are a writer. Don't be surprised if you don't sell very many, or if you sell out! I sold all but one of my books at one event, but the next time at the same event I sold very few. You can never tell. I hope you'll get out there, and if you don't have any books to sell, maybe you can attend a few events and encourage the authors who are out there. If you do go to an event and I'm there, say hello and bring me a latte! ;p

Thank God for the wisdom of experience, the ability to observe, love and contemplate most everything around me, from the rolling hills of East Texas to quirky cashiers, friends in need, loss and grieving, and celebration of the marvelous flow of individuals through my life. It all becomes material for my muse.

Doing something I love daily with pen and paper feels good. No, I have not completed the YA fantasy series nor revised and republished *Nurture Yourself First*, nor made significant inroads on a memoir. But I have written about 800 poems. That feels very good indeed.

Is there a way you can create regularly, combining your love of writing with the power of consistency? What freedom would you gain from showing up at your page — for the love of it — day after day? If you already write daily, how do you find it supportive? Would a faithful practice be a gift to your writer self?

I admit, I'm an emotional reader. Meaning, I read based on my mood. So, one day my nose is buried in a modern-day thriller (most recently, Dan Brown's *Deception Point*), and the next day I'm delving into a classic novel (currently, *Dune* by Frank Herbert). Fiction is usually saved for the evening hours, while my rotation of non-fiction books tends to occupy time and space with my morning cup of coffee.

Most recently, I bought a copy of *The Art of Woo*, by G. Richard Shell and Mario Moussa. How I found it among all the other stacked spines at Half-Priced Books, I'll never know, but somehow it made it into my wanting hand where it stayed almost glued for one full week. Now I'll admit that non-fiction isn't my favorite genre, but *The Art of Woo* is not only well written but also interesting and inspiring. Each chapter starts with one or more quotes to set the tone. One of my favorites appears towards the end of the book to introduce the section on *Character*, i.e. wooing with Integrity:

"Character is like a tree and reputation like its shadow.

The shadow is what we think of it; the tree is the real thing."

~Abraham Lincoln

Now, you might associate "woo" with love or poetry. But it has another meaning, one used as the book's subtitle: *Using strategic persuasion to sell your ideas*. In the book's own words, woo is "relationship-based persuasion, a strategic process for getting people's attention, pitching your ideas, and obtaining approval for your plans and projects. It is, in short, one of the most important skills in the repertoire of any entrepreneur, employee, or professional manager whose work requires them to rely on influence and persuasion rather than coercion and force."

I don't know about you, but I need all the help I can get when it comes to getting people's attention! And pitching my ideas can cause anxiety, sweaty palms, and heart palpitations. But this book helps demystify those things and provides a structured, logical framework that anyone can understand and implement. Afterall, who doesn't want to be an expert at wooing?

Linda is a member of the Underground Authors who created the Magnolia Bluff Crime Chronicles Series. Magnolia Bluff is a small fictional town in the Texas Hill Country. It is situated near the Burnet Reservoir. Murder and mayhem reign there. *Girlfriend Retreat*. . . Cheaper Than Therapy is Book 22 in the Magnolia Bluff Crime Chronicles Series.

Beginning in elementary school, Linda has enjoyed a core group of girlfriends. They meet annually for a girls's trip. More than once, they have been dubbed "the rowdy group," and all of them are included in the book when they travel to the Circle R Ranch in Magnolia Bluff for their annual get together. The women

will never be the same after their weekend in the Texas Hill Country. Will the friends survive the challenges they encounter? Murder, arson, deception, and secrets abound in what should be a quiet little town. The bigger question, however, is this: Will the town ever be the same after the invasion of the girls from Kilgore?

Linda Pirtle is a retired educator who taught the art of writing and understanding literature for years as an English teacher.
